### IT'S EXPIRED

As I grew up, I was a child who would eat about anything. I can remember coming home from school before my parents got home and raiding the cabinets, refrigerator, and pantry to find anything to eat. Whether it was leftovers or old cans of chili, I didn't seem to care. My wife, on the other hand, is not that way. She is not much of a leftover person and she refuses to eat foods past expiration dates. When we first got married, I can remember pulling out cans of food and Taylor taking one look at the top and saying, "throw it away." At those moments, I had flashbacks thinking of how many times I would find old cans that had been pushed to the back that I would simply blow the dust off of and eat. In hindsight, I can remember a few times that I probably shouldn't have eaten those.

We live in a society that is so fast paced that we can easily overlook a simple expiration date. As new cans come in, the old are simply pushed back. Of course, they still look the same, except for that date stamped on the bottom. When those cans are finally found, it is a tragedy that what was inside, and provided such nourishment, has been wasted by simply overlooking it. In our lives there is a similar tragedy that takes place each day when we miss opportunities to serve God. Paul spoke of the expiration dates of opportunities in Galatians 6:10, when he said, "So then, as we have opportunity, let us do good to everyone, and especially to those who are of the household of faith." When we meditate on that phrase "as we have opportunity" we can soon see the fact that the opportunities of today may no longer be available tomorrow. What we soon realize is that opportunities have expiration dates.

Upon thinking about opportunities that can be missed, I am reminded of Jesus in John 9. In this passage, Jesus passes by a man who has been blind his entire life. The disciples quickly begin questioning Jesus as to why such horrible circumstances could happen to someone. They wonder if it was because of his parents sin or was it that this man simply had sinned somehow. But Jesus replied that it wasn't because of sins from either the man or his parents but this man was blind so "that the works of God might be displayed in him." Jesus then made a powerful statement. In **John 9:4**, He says, "We must work the works of Him who sent Me while it is day; night is coming, when no one can work." After saying this,

Jesus spit on the ground, making mud, and put it on the man's eyes. After the man went to wash in the pool of Siloam, he came back seeing!

Imagine how different that day would have been if Jesus had simply said, "I am busy today but I will come back tomorrow." The blind man may have never been there the next day. He would have never had the opportunity to be healed by Christ. The people of the town would have never witnessed such an amazing miracle, and the blind man would have never been able to give his testimony about the events to the Pharisees. Most importantly, the man would have never believed in Jesus. In **John 9:39**, when the man finally meets Jesus again, he says, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped Him."

In our spiritual lives, doors that open opportunities to share the gospel can quickly be shut if we do not use them. This can leave us with a life of regret and expired opportunities. However, if we take advantage of the opportunities that God provides then we can truly find joy in our lives in Christ. Paul lived his life with an earnest desire to seek every opportunity that God placed before him. Even when there were many who were against Paul in Ephesus, he said in 1 Corinthians 16:9, "There is a wide-open door for a great work here, although many oppose me." How would we handle all the opposition that Paul went through? Would we choose to give up? Or would we continue seeking great opportunities, knowing that the world will always be against us (John 15:18-27).

In the end, life is one big opportunity to fulfill a purpose. The question is, what is that purpose? One of the best answers comes from one of the wisest men who walked on earth. Solomon. He said in Ecclesiastes 12:13, "The end of the matter; all has been heard. Fear God and keep His commandments, for this is the whole duty of man." This is the purpose that we need to work to fulfill each and every day, and every day brings us opportunities to do so. But each day is drawing closer to the last. Romans 13:11 tells us that "salvation is nearer to us now than when we first believed," and that each one of us are going to expire ourselves one day, and after that comes judgment (Hebrews 9:27). Our time on this earth is in God's hands and each opportunity to do His will and serve Him are slowly going away with each passing moment. Don't leave opportunities on the shelf to expire. Use them to share the Gospel of Christ to all you meet. It is the best nourishment for the soul.
